Agricultural Plot

Despite a few minor setbacks due to heavy rain earlier in the term, the school's agriculture facilities are certainly sprouting to life. Our poultry shed has been constructed and our garden beds are teeming with fresh produce.



A significant milestone in the project was with achieved the installation of our hydroponic and aquaponic facilities past few over the weeks. These were

provided by the company 'Sprouting Good Rooftop Farming'.

The school's partnership with 'Sprouting Good' will educate students on sustainable farming and healthy eating through the use of a portable rooftop farm education centre made from a converted 20ft shipping container. Whilst the container houses the aquaculture system, the greenhouse on top of the container contains the hydroponics. The resource saving aquaponic system offers simultaneous fish farming and vegetable growing.

Anti-racism and giving consideration and respect to others

Respect is a key element in student and staff expecatations (ROAD) at Seven Hills High School. Respect is an important part of everyday work and play.

At times, some people make others feel uncomfortable by referring to the "racial" or ethnic origins of others in an unacceptable way. This type of negative behaviour is racism. At Seven Hills High School, all students, staff and community members have a right to be treated with dignity and respect no matter which groups they belong to. At Seven Hills High School, we have an Anti-Racism Contact Officer (ARCO) trained and available to deal with issues that arise. Mr Davis is currently our ARCO.

If you think you have been treated badly because of your cultural background speak to a teacher, a head teacher, a deputy principal or the principal.

All allegations referred to the ARCO are treated in a confidential manner and are initially treated as a welfare issue and education is the focus.

Review of Special Religious Education and Special Education in Ethics in NSW government schools

The NSW Department of Education and Communities has commissioned an independent review of the implementation of Special Religious Education (SRE) and Special Education in Ethics (SEE) in NSW public schools.

The review is being conducted by an independent research company, ARTD Consultants. This company provides services in evaluating public policy. The review will inform ongoing improvement of SRE and SEE for the Department and providers.

How can you participate in the review?

You can complete a survey up until 31 July 2015 via an online portal, located at this link: http://forms.artd.com.au/s3/Online-contributionfor-parents-carers

The survey is in English and has 19 questions. For most questions you can select an answer from the multiple choice options provided. Only two questions ask for written answers. Extra written feedback for another five questions may be provided if desired but is not essential.
