Principal's Report

Since our last newsletter student groups have displayed their initiative by introducing a roll group sporting competition to conclude Term 2, led the school in recognising significant events, achieved qualifications in several training programs and participated in community mentoring programs. As a school we had the opportunity to once again recognise student success and to induct new members to the Student representative Council.

On Thursday 28th May Teea Beavan, Veronica Booth and Leeaf Owen delivered a wonderful presentation to the whole school to celebrate Reconciliation Week. In that assembly Axel Rivai and Kate Moseley introduced to the school a Student Representative Council initiative to increase spirit within each rollcall group, a Quidditch Challenge, which has now begun, with the final to be held in Week 9.

Last week, at a formal assembly, we recognised the students who gained the top three places in each age group at the Cross Country and Athletics Carnivals and those students who successfully completed training courses in food hygiene and barista operations. Also at the assembly, Mrs Thurlow led the induction of our newest members of the Student Representative Council, Year 7 students, Callum Pike, Rachael McDermott, Shyan Goodall and Helena McMeekin.

One of the school's goals for 2015 is to create partnerships with organisations that enhance our student's learning experiences. Over the last month a number of students have had the opportunity to work with team from I-manifest, gaining an insight into the employment possibilities available in the entertainment industry. Other mentoring programs have been initiated with community organisations and school-based programs have been developed and implemented to support the learning of our students.

As you can see by the school calendar the next few weeks contain some major events, especially for Year 10 at this stage in their transition to Wyndham College with interviews being conducted with their parents and carers and the first stage of the subject selection process finishing at the end of this term.

On the last Tuesday of this term we will be celebrating, for the first time, the achievements of students who, in each class, have gained first place or have been selected by their teacher as being the most improved over the first semester. The parents of those students receiving awards will be provided with an invitation to join us at these assemblies.

Finally, at this week's P&C Meeting Mr MacLaren, Head Teacher Welfare, will be discussing with those present the range of initiatives on offer to support each student's wellbeing.

Deputy Principal's Report

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability

In May 2013, all Education Ministers from Commonwealth, state and territory governments endorsed the implementation of a nationally consistent collection of data on school students with disability in all Australian schools (government, independent and Catholic).

The nationally consistent approach to data collection will provide all Australian schools, education authorities and the community with a clear picture of the number of students with disability in schools and the adjustments they are provided to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students.

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is being phased in over a three year period. The first limited data collection occurred in October 2013 and the second in August 2014. Selected schools in Australia were chosen to participate in the 2013 and 2014 data collections.

From 2015, all Australian schools will participate in the NCCD, with the first comprehensive collection occurring in August 2015.

The Australian Education Regulation 2013 (the Regulation)

(www.comlaw.gov.au/Details/F2014L01723)

requires the operators of government and non-government schools (approved authorities) to provide information to the Australian Government Department of Education and Training (the department) for the purposes of the NCCD.

The information that approved authorities must give to the department is set out at subsection 58A(2) of the Regulation. This includes, in relation to each student with a disability at a school operated by the approved authority:

- the student's level of education (i.e. primary or secondary)
- the student's category of disability (i.e. physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional)
- the student's level of adjustment (i.e. support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive adjustment).

The information **will not identify individual students** (subsection 58A(3) of the Regulation); no information that could reasonably enable the department to identify individual students will be provided by approved authorities to the department¹.

Other details about the information to be collected and the format in which the information is to be provided to the department, will be contained in guidelines approved by the Education Council (the committee of the Council of Australian Governments comprising the Commonwealth and state and territory Ministers responsible for education). The NCCD guidelines for the 2015 data collection are expected to be finalised by May 2015 and will be available on the department's website.

The information collected by schools for the purposes of the 2015 national data collection will ultimately be provided to the department. In some cases this will involve the school passing the data directly to the department and in other cases the school will provide the data to its state and territory government agency or other relevant body, depending on the school's particular arrangements. The state and territory government agency or other body will further de-identify school level data, and may aggregate the data at the state and territory level, before providing the data to the department.

The department, on behalf of the Joint Working Group, will use the information collected for the purposes of preparing reports for and briefing the Australian Education, Early Childhood Development and Youth Senior Officials Committee and the Education Council in relation to the NCCD. For the purposes of preparing these reports or briefing material, the department will ensure that the information is aggregated sufficiently so that no student's identity could reasonably be ascertained.

The aggregated information held by the department may also be used as an input to policy development for future funding and other policy requirements as required by the Education Council.

The department will not otherwise disclose any personal information to third parties, including overseas recipients, without consent or unless authorised or required by law.

English/HSIE Report

Term 2 has been a busy one for the English faculty. We have found that students are highly engaged in the new content being delivered. This is reflected in the very encouraging results students have been achieving in both the Stage 4 and Stage 5 English

Courses. The English Faculty have been working rigorously to create programs that both meet the requirements of the Stage 4 and Stage 5 English syllabus and engage students. We have taken a collegial approach in the development of the programs and this has enabled consistency across classes in different courses.

Student Voice

The English Faculty are focusing on ways to authentically integrate student voice within the English Curriculum. This means each term students will be involved in completing a 'Learning Reflection Sheet' that will question students on:

- their likes and dislikes regarding English;
- their feelings about assessment tasks;
- how involved or engaged they are with the teaching and learning in their classroom;
- the delivery of instruction within their classroom;
- how effective they feel the feedback provided us in allowing them to improve on their whole grade, class assessment and examinations.

Using this data, the English Faculty will update and refine both teaching and learning programs and practice.

How to support your child in English

- Monitor your child's reading. Make sure they are reading for at least 20 minutes a night. Encourage them to read from a wide variety of genres.
- Check the course outlines. These outline all the class-based and whole grade assessment tasks the content being delivered each unit of work, timelines and due dates for tasks.
- Create an assessment task timetable. Look through their workbooks as there is work in there that will help them with their assessment tasks.
 Speak to them about what they are doing in class.
 Try to read the novels they study.
- Regularly encourage your child to view the TV news or current affair programs.
