We met the coordinator of Streamwatch, Greg Macdonald, who chatted to us about the importance of our water testing and bug surveys. He explained how the urbanization and the nearby North West rail link has impacted Lalor creek and its water quality. We also heard about Gumbusia, an introduced fish, which is the greatest threat to our native water creatures. They give birth to live young, are found globally and feed on our native tadpoles and fish eggs. They also cause disabilities in eels and fish by nipping their fins. We spent the rest of the day looking around the museum and were lucky enough to be invited to see the special Spider exhibition.

It is a great museum and some of us will definitely be back to spend some more time viewing the new exhibitions.
