## MOBILE PHONE POLICY

To align our policy with the NSW Government initiative to ban mobile phone use in schools, from the beginning of Term 4, we will be making our school a phone-free space to improve teaching and learning. To assist in the implementation of this initiative, we will be using a system called Yondr.

Yondr has been implemented in over 1,000 schools across 21 countries to facilitate an engaging learning environment and has substantially improved learning and wellbeing outcomes for students.

The Yondr Program utilises a simple, secure pouch that stores a phone. Every student will secure their phone in a personally assigned Yondr pouch when they arrive at school. Students will maintain possession of their phones and will not be permitted to use them until their pouches are opened at the end of the school day. Students will be required to bring their Yondr pouch to and from school each day and will be responsible for them at all times.

Loss, damage, or destruction of the pouch will result in a replacement pouch that will incur a cost of \$20.

We understand that from time to time it may be necessary for students to access their phones for medical, learning or wellbeing purposes throughout the day. This will be negotiated with and supervised by the Principal or Deputy Principals with students and their families.

We believe that phones have great utility. We have also found that learning and social behaviour improve dramatically when students are fully engaged with their teachers and classmates.

Yondr recently surveyed over 1200 school partners to measure the effects of creating phone-free educational environments. These schools achieved notable progress in multiple areas:

- 84% saw a change in student engagement.
- 72% saw a positive change in student behaviour.
- 68% saw a positive change in academic performance.

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### What if I want to reach my child during the school day?

We want our students to be engaged in their learning. If you need to contact your child during the day, call the school office on 9624 3329 and the information will be passed on.

#### What if there is a school emergency?

In the case of a school emergency, we direct our students to safety first, following our school emergency response protocols.

#### Will my child's mobile phone be safe?

The policy states phones will be locked in Yondr pouches and stored in their bag. Phones will remain the responsibility of students.

#### What if the Yondr pouch gets damaged or lost?

The Yondr pouch, whilst allocated to students, remains the property of Seven Hills High School. The pouches are not easily broken; however, they are not indestructible. Students that lose or damage a pouch will be allocated a new one at a replacement cost of \$20.

Note: Damage consists of any signs that the physical integrity of the pouch has been compromised, whether intentional or unintentional, as determined by the school or Yondr staff.

#### What if my child uses their mobile phone during school time?

Students that use their mobile during the day are in breach of the policy. They will be referred to their Deputy Principal and the phone will be confiscated for the remainder of the day.
